The College serves permanently excluded and medically vulnerable children aged from 4 to 16. A high proportion of its roll have SENs including EHCPs. Rising rolls has led to overcrowding of the current facilities creating a barrier to the delivery of EHCP provision. While stays are generally short, some children will have extended stays. They may have complex needs so suitable provision cannot be agreed quickly or they are nearing the end of their statutory education and will move on to a post-16 setting.

It serves 8 children with EHCPs for ASD. Since the unit opened the level and complexity of need has increased and children spend a higher proportion of their time in the unit, so there are more children in the unit at any one time. Consequently the unit now has inadequate space to provide properly differentiated provision. The project would provide a second classroom, a small withdrawal / therapy area and a dedicated WC area.

Schools	Series of individual meetings with schools - late 2017 / early 2018	The Council commissioned a comprehensive review of Resource Bases and associated provision. This identified a number of areas for improvement to ensure provision matches current needs. Two stood out as requiring capital investment, Foundry College where an increased number of permanently excluded children has meant the current premises are unfit for purpose and the Little Acorns unit at Wescott Infant school, where increased complexity of need has meant the current premises are too small. These proposals have been discussed with the schools during 2017 and early 2018.	
Wokingham Schools, REACH Wokingham, (the Wokingham parent carer forum), neighbouring local authorities, our CCG, Berkshire Healthcare Foundation Trust, Charities (e.g. NDCS ASD, ASD Family Help). The Review and questionnaire were wide ranging (ie extended beyond the SPCF brief), but the accompanying email explicitly stated that the review formed the basis for our proposed SPCF programme, and the questionnaire included the Foundry and Wescott schemes. No negative responses have been received to date. One school has indicated they would had a potential inclusion scheme, but this was for children on the main-stream school roll and strategic provision (ie serving the whole borough, where children would otherwise be placed out of borough) must be our priority.

The questionnaire lists the two SPCF projects, in the context of an overarching review of all Resource Bases. This covers management, finance, system leadership, and the current pattern of need. It identified areas of increasing need (complexity and numbers) and underused provision. New and enhanced provision (including a new school or Resource Base) for children with ASD is required. Three potential smaller scale capital projects with an ASD / SEMH focus were identified, two of which were consulted on in this exercise. The conversation is ongoing but there is no significant dissent to date	

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
