- National Priority Public Health England
- NHS 5 year Forward Plan

National Learning

Public Health England (PHE) has recently published a guide to local suicide prevention planning (2016). In it, they identify ten things that <u>everyone needs to know</u> about suicide prevention.

Responsible media reporting is critical Research shows that inappropriate reporting of suicide may lead to imitative or 'copycat' behaviour.


BSPS-Recommendations


- Ensure bereavement information and access to support is available to those bereaved by suicide, including professionals involved in the case.
- 5. Support the media in delivering sensitive approaches to suicide and suicidal behaviour;
- Liaise with local media to encourage reference to and use of guidelines for the reporting of suicide through a summit with local press and media organisations, and to provide information to professionals on the sensitive reporting of suicide.


The context

- The highest suicide rate in the UK in 2015 was among men aged 45 to 59, at 22.3 deaths per 100,000,
- Slightly lower than the record high seen in 2013. This age group also had the highest rate among women, at 7.3 deaths per 100,000 population
- The average cost of suicide in someone of working age in England is estimated to be £1.67 million.
- The suicide audit taken in Berkshire between 2012-14 recorded 120 deaths, 70% of these were classified as suicide by the coroner and the other 30% were undetermined deaths / open verdicts.

Suicide is now the leading cause of death directly related to pregnancy in the year after mothers give birth, a report has found.

Although maternal deaths by all causes have fallouin the last docade, the number of suicides in pregnant women and new mothers has not changed since 2003. Campaigners warn that a lack of funding for preventative care at a local level is leaving women at risk of mental health problems.

The latest Confidential Enquiry into Maternal Deaths, published today, reveals that between 2009 and 2014 III women in the UK died by suicide during or up to a your after promancy.

Direct causes of death are those related to complications of pregnancy, labour and delivery, and the post-natal period. Indirect causes are pre-existing conditions that may be appravated by the physiologic demands of pregnancy. Lesley Regan, president of the Royal Callege of Obstetricians and Gynascologists said "Greater integration between primary and secondary care is urgently required to ensure that women with significant medical and prechiatric conditions are assessed before becoming pregnant."

The report advises medical profes-

sionals to look out for "red flag" signals sign th in expectant and new mothers, including "new and persistent expressions of incompetency as a mother or estrangeper100. ment from the infant"

Vicki Nash, of the mental health charity Mind, said: "More than 40 per cent of areas in England have no specialist community perinatal mental health team, and those that do often fail to reach accepted standards.

"Many new mothers go through a period where they feel down after having a baby, known as the 'baby blues. This usually lasts for a few days, but if it goes on for weeks or roonths or 17 percen becomes more severe then it could be to have a

Man ends his life 'without warning'

A MAN from Woldingham committed solicide without any sort of warning, an inquest has heard.

John Frederick Bromley, 83, of Harman Court in Churchill Drive, was discovered dead in his home on Sunday, August 26 by his boother, Peter and alster-in-lase Tracy.

The inquest held at Reading Town Hall on Tuesday heard how Poter and Tracy had gone to whit John as they always did on a Sunday morning. but received no reply when they knocked on his from door.

Tracy looked through a window, but could not see anything, so looked through the letterbox and saw a step-ladder in the ballway. The couple thought this strange as they described john as meticulous' and would never leave things lying around the house.

Peter used a key he had to open the front door, and found his brother suspended by a rope above the door.

In a witness statement, Peter said that his brother was 'clearly dead', so the couple alarted Bracknell Forest Homes, who looked after Mr Bromkey's flat, who in turn called the emergency services.

Paramedics from South Central Ambulance Service, who arrived at the scene at 11.32am, reported Mr Bromicy's body to be cold and stiff. and likely to have been dead for some time.

Police officers attended but noted that the property had been secure, the furniture was next and tidy and there was no evidence of any third party involvement.

Mum overdosed to stop constant pain

A GRIEF stricken mother who was living in agony every day suffering, an inquest ruled. 29 with a sulcide note

Smma Jones, assistant coroner for Berkshire, decided she had deliberately taken an overdose because of the note she had left behind.

Speaking at an inquest at Reading Town Hall on May 4 she added. "Your mother had an extensive medical history and it is clear to me abe intended to take her own life

"If she had not left the note, it is possible she could have been conflosed about the time of day and accidentally overdosed.

"When considering suicide we have to be satisfied beyond reasonable doubt and all of the evidence we have suggests a deliburate course of action."
